


1. Position your head so that the sails of the Sydney Opera House protrude behind you, looking like ears. 2. Pass a very large fig tree in the Botanic Gardens. 3. Look up at the Chief Secretary's Building between Bridge, Macquarie and Phillip Streets. The sandstone sculptures will look back down at you, signifying Mercy, Justice and Wisdom, Art, Art Science and Labour (top to bottom). 4. Stop at the Lands Department Building at 22—33 Bridge Street to see sculptures of explorers and legislators. 5. Look up to see suspended birdcages at Angel Place. 6. Enter Paspaley at 2 Martin Place to see the golden hare.

(Clue: Wisdom, Justice, Mercy, Science and Labour leads to Art ...)

(Clue: Banks is standing with many friends)

(Clue: Penny Pockets says, "Listen for the Honeyeater's song!")

(Clue: Pearl of Wisdom ... insignia of Paspaley)
